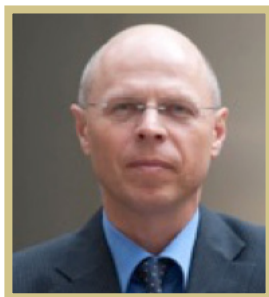

KEYNOTE: THE DUNKELFELD PROJECT



PROFESSOR KLAUS BEIER

MD, PhD

The presentation will describe the development of the primary prevention approach in the Dunkelfeld which started in 2005 at the Berlin Institute of Sexology and Sexual Medicine. The core idea was to reach out for self-motivated, help-seeking pedophilically inclined individuals not known to the legal authorities. The advertising campaign will be explained and the outcome for adults (PPD) and juveniles (PPJ) separately reported.

The Dunkelfeld Prevention Project now offers individuals with sexual feelings towards pre-pubescent and pubescent children – including those who have offended – confidential help and treatment. Backed by a national media campaign the Project has become a critical component in strategies to keep children safe. It is currently operating in eleven cities throughout Germany.

Professor Beier, the architect of the Dunkelfeld Project, is a leading international expert on child sexual abuse prevention. In this presentation he will explain how the Dunkelfeld Project works and share outcomes they have been able to demonstrate.

Dave Gee MBE, retired Detective Chief Superintendent UK Police Service and Christabel Chamarette, Clinical Psychologist, former SafeCare Inc Director, will share a conversation with the Symposium guests about creative innovative projects similar to the Dunkelfeld Project that they have come across over the past 20 years. In particular Dave has experience from his involvement in the Launch of StopItNow UK in Derbyshire in 2004 and will bring an update on the current operations of UK StopItNow and Lucy Faithful Foundation. Christabel Chamarette will present the work of StopItNow USA which she visited in 2008. SafeCare Inc also hosted a visit to WA by Sarita Hudson of StopItNow USA who presented a training workshop for practitioners in 2007. The Stop and SAFE Programs in New Zealand will also be described.

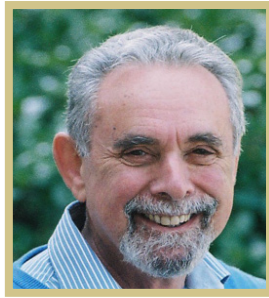
In Australia SafeCare in WA and Cedar Cottage in NSW were the only community-based Treatment Programs with government funding and closed in 2009 and 2014 respectively. Currently in WA two 20 -30 week treatment groups per year have been run since 2010 as part of the private practices of Peter Dunlop and Christabel Chamarette for child sexual abuse and CEM offending. Statistics from the 2010 -2017 groups will be briefly presented.

PARKERVILLE PROJECT

TRAUMA IMPACTS THE ENTIRE FAMILY, NOT JUST THE CHILD



AMANDA PATON

Theories on attachment would tell us that a child does not exist in isolation but is a part of a series of reciprocal relationships. Accepting this premise, responses to child abuse must support the family around the child, rather than just the child. It is through the ongoing reciprocal relationships that healing from trauma will occur.

Parkerville Children and Youth Care Inc. (Parkerville CYC), WA Police, Child Protection and Family Support (CPFS) have developed the Multi-agency Investigation and Support Team (MIST) which operates from the George Jones Child Advocacy Centre (GJCAC) in Armadale. Central to the model is the bringing together of multiple government agencies and therapeutic support services to provide an integrated and early intervention approach to children who have experienced sexual abuse.

2.30 JUVENILES WHO ARE SEXUALLY INAPPROPRIATE TOWARDS OTHER CHILDREN

WHO ARE THEY AND WHAT HAPPENS TO THEM?

Western Australian data suggest that about 18% of persons believed to be responsible for substantiated child sexual abuse reported to the Department of Community Services are juveniles. Although almost certainly an underestimation of the actual rate these figures at least draw attention to harm that this often overlooked group can cause. Most (97%) are boys and 89% act alone. Their average age is 14 and half are related to the abused child while a third are a friend or neighbour. The average age of the abused children is seven and 67% are girls. Research suggests that some of the juveniles will themselves have experienced childhood abuse, particularly emotional abuse, sexual abuse or neglect. Critical questions which the paper will attempt to explore include the supports or treatment available in Western Australia for these juveniles and how it is accessed.

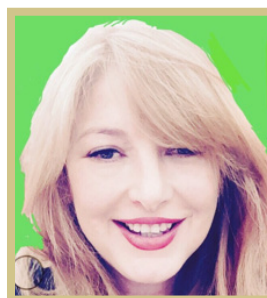

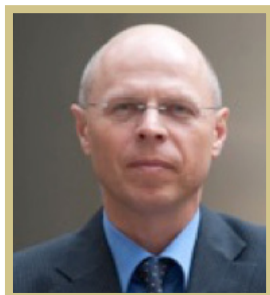

11.30 COMMUNITY RISK-MAPPING

HOLLY-ANN MARTIN

Community Risk-Mapping exercise is a visual display and gathers qualitative data that can give adults the insight into where and why children participate in risk taking and private behaviours, also areas in community where they feel safe and unsafe. Then feedback can be given to Local Councils, Police and other agencies to help improve the conditions around the communities to help children feel safe for example better lighting in some areas or condom trees where people are performing sexual acts, etc.

The purpose of the community map is to identify areas:

- where children/students feel safe
- where children/students feel unsafe
- where children/students participate in risk-taking behaviour
- where children/students perform private acts
- where children/students observe others performing private acts
- where children/students are shown private pictures or movies

Community members can imagine, believe, suspect or even know of many things that go on within their community. But there is always amazement and dismay at the information that is revealed with community mapping, as it is irrefutable evidence of the scope and magnitude of the problems facing communities in relation to their young.

Certain factors recur in the motivation of crime by adults: (a) current stresses or losses, which (b) arouse or trigger emotional pain of childhood origins, that (c) induce decisions or behaviours that reduce felt distress or improve feelings. Offenders often experience upsets or tensions before offending, but are not aware that these feelings stem from unmet needs in childhood and reside in memory. When activated, these feelings add to the pool of distress experienced prior to offending. In the non-violent sexual abuse of children by men, psychological assessment of perpetrators shows: (1) a history of childhood affectional neglect; (2) (a) their having been victims of child sexual abuse, or (b) their having engaged in precocious sexual activities as children. (These produce traumatic sexualization wherein affection and sexual feelings become confused); (3) offending typically occurs when current stresses trigger negative feelings associated with unmet dependency needs. This knowledge - and an understanding of how unmet affectional needs and early sexual experiences can distort sexuality and promote offending - can be put to use to reduce the incidence of child sexual abuse. Suggestions are invited on how this knowledge can be disseminated.

Minister McGurk has also worked as a producer for the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, and in native title for the Yamatji Land and Sea Council.

Mr. Tom Percy QC was admitted to practice in 1978 after graduating from UWA. He was elected to the WA Bar Association in 1984 and took silk in 1997. He practices primarily in the area of Criminal trials and appeals. He is a former National Director and State President of the Australian Lawyers Alliance. He won the WA Civil Justice Award in 2006, The WA Law Society Community Service Award in 2007 and the WA Lawyer of the Year award in 2013. He is currently Head of Chambers at Albert Wolff Chambers in Perth. He is a regular political and legal columnist for the Sunday Times and on commercial radio. In his spare time he likes to go to the Football, the Races and the Pub; not necessarily in that order.

MD, PhD

Professor Klaus Beier, MD, PhD is a Professor of Sexology and Sexual Medicine at the Charité – Universitätsmedizin in Berlin and a member of the International Academy of Sex Research, President of the German Society of Sexual Medicine, Sex Therapy and Sexology, founder of the German scientific journal, *Sexuologie* and reviewer of several international journals. His latest book published in English is *Sexual Medicine in Clinical Practice* (Klaus M. Beier, Kurt Loewit, Springer: New York 2013). Dr Beier's current research focuses on the prevention of child sexual abuse and encourages self-identified undetected paedophiles and hebephiles to seek professional help to avoid committing sexual abuse or pornography offences. To this end in 2005 he established the Dunkelfeld Prevention Project, which is supported by state aided government funds and the German child protection organization. It now operates in ten additional locations in Germany. www.dont-offend.org This program has been further developed to work with at risk juveniles between 12 and 18 years. www.just-dreaming-of-them.org

Rosemary Cant is an independent consultant who has led or been a senior consultant on over 100 evaluation, review or research projects for State and Commonwealth agencies in Western Australia and the Eastern States. A number of these projects have related to child protection. Rosemary is also an expert advisor to the Working with Children Screening Unit. She was invited to provide an expert opinion on questions of grooming, non-disclosure and suicide in later life to the Special Inquiry into the response of government agencies and officials in relation to allegations of sexual abuse at St Andrews Hostel Katanning.

Rosemary is undertaking a PhD at the University of Western Australia on the topic of reported child sexual abuse.

CHRISTABEL CHAMARETTE

Christabel is a registered Clinical Psychologist with over 40 years' experience in the treatment of violence and child sexual abuse. She was the Clinical Director of SafeCare from 1997 – 2008, a family counselling service. She is a lecturer on CSA to postgraduate Psychiatrists and the W.A. Police Academy. She is currently in private practice M.Psych which involves individual and group therapy, supervision and teaching. Since 2010 she has been a co-facilitator of a community-based treatment programme for child sexual offending and internet pornography

and presenting “Helping Families Heal” a program for Aboriginal communities both in Perth and the Kimberly.

MERCURIO CICCHINI

Clinical Psychologist

Mercurio is a Clinical Psychologist in private practice. Over the past 40 years he has worked in the WA justice system, both as a practitioner in prisons and as an external contractor providing psychological assessments for the criminal Courts. A focus on assessing offenders and a desire to understand “what makes people tick” led to the development of a special interest in gaining knowledge on how developmental experiences in childhood come to influence the lives of adults. This knowledge is applied to guide therapy and for education to facilitate prevention.

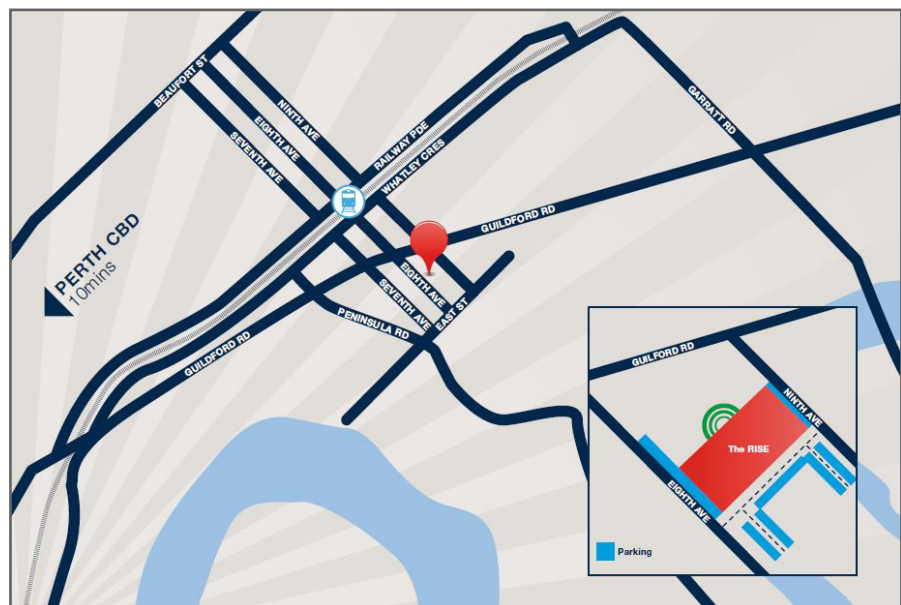

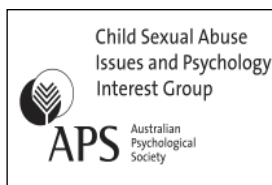

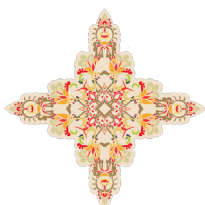
